When you finish writing something, you feel accomplished, right? The fact that you have applied your thoughts onto paper and gotten it all out there. You feel successful and a sense of relief that you are done. So why should people who do not write their own books get to feel this way? Why should people who only have ideas for a book, and not be able to write it, get all the credit and get to feel like they have accomplished something so profound? Well they shouldn't, and that is why using a ghostwriter is such a copout.

#### What is a ghostwriter?

A ghostwriter is a person hired to write something, usually a book, for somebody else and receive no credit for it. The book will give credit to someone else, who probably had the idea for the book, but did not actually decide to write it. Oxford Dictionary, Merriam-Webster Dictionary, and even Dictionary.com states that an author is a writer of literary work, such as a book, article, etc. While many who use ghostwriters may consider themselves authors, in my mind, they will never be an author. Sitting down and writing a book is a great task, and getting to call yourself a writer when you didn't do that is disrespectful to all the amazing authors out there. Anybody can come up with an idea, but to actually put that idea on paper and actually write a whole book, is something to feel immensely proud of. Not just anybody should get to feel that, so claiming to be an author is incredibly immoral.

### Is it ethical?

Taking credit for someone else's work is never right, so why should this be the exception? Well, in my opinion, it isn't. While ghostwriters do sign a contract and agree for it to be this way, this is not right by the so-called "authors". They are making an unethical decision to use a ghostwriter and should not consider themselves an author.

### Is it plagiarism?

Growing up, we are always told to cite our sources for everything in school. Make a bibliography, add links at the end of a slide show, etc. This should be no different from that. These "authors" should have to cite their sources and say who their ghostwriter is, but they find ways around that. Since they make ghostwriters sign contracts, they do not have to cite them as their writer and so it is technically not plagiarism. While it may not officially be considered that, I still consider it that and think that they should be credited for all of their hard work.

# Cricket World Cup By Aditya Bura

Cricket, what is it? Most people have heard of the sport, but nobody seems to know how it is played. Cricket is played by many countries worldwide, the primary countries being India, Australia, and England. Originally introduced in 1611 in England, it was popularized mainly by India. The sport is played eleven versus two at once on the pitch--two being the batters, who are trying to score runs and points, and the eleven being the fielders and the bowler. The bowler, similar to a pitcher, throws the ball towards one of the batters, bouncing the ball once. The batter tries to hit the ball; if it goes into the stands, that is six runs. If it goes outside of the boundary, that is four runs. The field is one big circle. For example, if the batter hits far but not far enough to go to the boundary, he runs to the other side of the small rectangular pitch that he is on. If he makes it to the other side without getting out, that's one run. While he runs, the other batter will also run and switch places. On each side of the small rectangular pitch, there are wickets. If those get hit, that's out.



The Cricket World Cup is an event that only occurs once every four years, spanning a little over a month.
