## CREAMY CHAI POSSET SERVED INSIDE APPLES

#### Ingredients:

3 ½ cups Heavy Cream ½ cup+1 tbsp Granulated Sugar 2 ½ tbsp Lemon Juice 5-6 Chai Tea Bags 3 tsp(1 tbsp) Vanilla Extract 5 Firm Apples



#### Instructions:

- 1. In a saucepan, combine the heavy cream, sugar, and chai tea over medium heat.
  - 2. Simmer for 5-6 minutes, stirring often.
- 3. Remove the tea bags (squeeze them gently against a spoon to extract flavor).
  - 4. Stir in the lemon juice and vanilla extract.
    - 5. Strain the mixture through a sieve.
- 6. Cut the apples in half lengthwise and hollow out with a spoon
  - 7. Pour the posset into the apples and chill for 2 hours.



Chef's Tip: Top each apple with cinnamon sugar, whipped cream, or honey for extra warmth and that fall glow

## An Interview with Erica Lunding By Misha Kapoor

Q: What is your name and your role in the Chelmsford High School Theater Department?

A: "My name is Erica Lunding, and I am the director of the Chelmsford Theater Guild."

Q: What is your favorite part about putting on a show?

A: "The first thing that comes to mind is the first time we have an audience, because I always find that I'm watching the show as if I'm in the audience that I've never seen it before which comes with its own things because I'm like, 'Oh I should have done this differently,' but I think that it's my favorite part. It's like exhilarating, and it gets a little bit of adrenaline in the same way that the people on stage do."



Q: How much work is put into the musical that isn't seen by the audience? What do you wish people would recognize more about putting on a show?

A: "The beauty of theater, and something that is really nice about it, is that the audience doesn't see all the hard work. It's meant to look easy and effortless."

[About what she wants people to recognize more] "... all the time and effort spent outside of rehearsal. The audience understands there are rehearsals, but the time that people spend outside of rehearsal is spent memorizing lines, music, and harmonies at home. The same goes for the crew, mapping things out on computers and such."

Q: This year's musical is Oklahoma!, obviously a revolutionary in theater. What is the thought process behind choosing a show? A: "In general, I start by thinking about shows that I like personally. The second level of that is talking with Craig, the technical director, because he has lots of ideas. I like getting other people's opinions to get a broad list of all the shows we think would be fun. Then we think about them in terms of what the pit looks like because we have such a strong music program in Chelmsford, and it's really awesome to pick a show that highlights a big pit orchestra. Then there is knowing that we could fill all the parts. If it's a show that has 14 guy leads, maybe not because we only have 10 guys in our program."

Q: When you do choose a show, do you see a cast in your mind or is that all thought about in the audition process?

A: "Just thinking through, do we have the cast overall, not saying that we are precasting, but just get an idea of 'We do have enough people to put this on'. I'm not sure exactly who's going to play what parts, but we do have options."

Q: What is the timing for getting a show from nothing to a full production in just 3 months?

A: "Craig and I start work over the summer, and we do some of the production team stuff where the advisors will get together. We will talk through things that we need to make sure we cover, especially pit-related, because the pit doesn't rehearse until a bit later, so making sure Mr. DeStefano, the pit director, has everything he needs or needs to order. When we actually get into working constantly, it is late August/early September. That's when I start doing work, like from a director-choreographer perspective, and then once we get into rehearsals, it's when everyone else starts doing stuff too





#### Q: If you could describe Oklahoma! in 3 words, what would they be and why?

A: "Yeehaw, musical, and delightful. Delightful because there are some loose dark themes in the show, but nothing really heavy. Anyone who sees the show will leave being like, 'Wow, that was fun!' I say musical because it feels like a real musical, just because there are these big, strong dance numbers overall, and then there's really fun comedic relief throughout the scenes. There are some serious elements, but there's also comedy to it, and it's big and spectacular, which is why I say musical, which sounds obvious. Yeehaw is because of the theme. Obviously, it takes place in the territory that is now the state of Oklahoma, so it is all about community and experiences of all the people who lived there."

#### Q: What drew you to the CHS theater department?

A: "I graduated from Chelmsford High School in 2013, and theater was a huge part of my high school career. I spent so much time in the building, so when I had the opportunity to come back as a choreographer for the musical for Pippin, four or five years ago, I said, 'I'll do it, it sounds fun!'And then I choreographed for the last 4 years and became the director. I wanted to be the choreographer because it was a theater I cared about, where I graduated from, and spent a lot of time and effort in my formative years here. And then just fell into the director stuff because our previous director couldn't come back, and I was like I'll do it so here I am, but it's really fun."

#### Q: Do you have a background in theater yourself?

A: "The Chelmsford High School theater Guild was really important to me as a teenager, so it felt obvious that I would step into that role and curate it for all the students that are here now. They'd walk away with the same experience I did, which is just loving theater, caring a lot about theater, and having a great time."

## Q: Finally, is there anything you would like to share about yourself or the theater guild as a whole that we did not get to in this interview?


A: "One thing that I want to highlight is that this year is that we have so many freshmen who are involved in the production. This is our first year in the last four or five years that we have as many freshmen as we do. That's really awesome and promising, and I hope they all come back next year and that they continue to do theater. I hope it becomes a really big piece in their High School careers."

We hope you saw Chelmsford High School's production of Oklahoma!



# Artist Spotlight





**Art and Writing by Charlotte Ware** 

Jane Goodall was an influential primatologist whose life's work has revolutionized our understanding of animals, conservation, and nature. Born in London in 1934, she fell in love with wildlife at a young age, bringing her to Gombe Stream National Park in Tanzania. There, she began what would become a 60-year study of chimpanzees. Without formal scientific training at first, Goodall transformed primatology by discovering that chimpanzees use tools, are not vegetarians, and experience complex emotions once thought to be exclusively human. Her affectionate and personal relationship with animals changed the way wildlife research was conducted, shifting field science away from solely quantitative data and towards a more emotional understanding of animal behavior. Beyond her scientific discoveries, Goodall was a prominent advocate of environmental conservation and the well-being of animals. Her spirit and ideals live on in her Jane Goodall Institute and Roots & Shoots program. Jane Goodall certainly left an indelible mark on conservation and science, and her compassionate way of living stands as an inspiring example for how we should treat the world around us.



# In Defense of Silent Reading By Samhita Badhri

In the 1960's, The Uninterrupted Sustained Silent Reading Program (USSR) was first proposed by Lyman Hunt at the University of Vermont. By the 1970s, it was being implemented throughout United States public schools. Almost sixty years later, it feels as though its presence is waning. At Chelmsford Public Schools, we were allocated amounts of time throughout middle school that were time for us to read. No assigned book, no post-reading summary, just a silent class period and a book of our choice. Entering high school, the emphasis quickly shifted to keeping up with fast-paced curriculum, homework, sports, and extracurriculars, leaving little time to read for enjoyment inside or outside the classroom. But perhaps this lack of exposure contributes to larger issues.

In 2023, 54% of United States adults have a literacy rate below a 6th-grade level. While these numbers can be attributed to a variety of causes--income inequality and learning disabilities, -a root cause of it is people not engaging with literature that piques their interest at older ages.

Silent reading offers numerous benefits: It forces students to grapple with challenging vocabulary and pronunciation on their own, increases reading speed, and allows students to connect deeply with the book and gain greater insights.

However silent reading provides logistical challenges. English teacher and author Dan Tricario tackled two major problems: time allocation and interest. In order to effectively and consistently incorporate silent reading as a daily activity, he chose for ten minute sessions daily to get students in the habit of reading. He also tried various methods to peak their interests on books: library tours and exchanging book recommendations—but he found that it was most effective to simply discuss the books with his students and explore personal interests and recommendations for them.

Many teachers still incorporate silent reading in their classrooms, however it is also important to allow students to read books of their choice. By normalizing daily reading, for fun, it will help students develop lifelong skills and perhaps allow reading to become a hobby instead of a chore.

#### A Color Conclusion










## MATH



#### Works Cited

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


Can' take my eyes off of you Frankie Vallie
